- ✓ SIS Sport, Aquatic and Recreation Draft 2 Consultation closed Friday, 17 June 2022. The project includes 5 qualifications, 3 skills sets and 45 units of competency. <u>Click here</u> to view the project page.
- Infection Control Draft 2 Validation closed 15 July. # **NSW Update**

**Smart and Skilled Updates** 

Two July Smart and Skilled Updates are out and published on the <u>SkillsIQ NSW ITAB</u> webpage. Update 177, includes seven Hospitality qualifications now included on the *Skilling for Recovery Full Qualification List*:

- SIT20322 CII in Hospitality
- SIT20421 Certificate II in Cookery
- SIT30622 Certificate III in Hospitality
- SIT30821 Certificate III in Commercial Cookery
- SIT40422 Certificate IV in Hospitality
- SIT40521 Certificate IV in Kitchen Management and
- SIT50422 Diploma of Hospitality Management.

Smart and Skilled Update 170-173 includes the NSW <u>Skills List update Version 13.1</u> and the Smart and Skilled <u>Prices and Fees Schedule Version 13.1</u>. Version 4.0 of the Smart and Skilled Policy on *Non-Apprenticeship Pathways for Trade-Related Qualifications* has been released. This program aims to support individuals who have trade or industry experience and would benefit from a trade qualification outside of an apprenticeship. Qualifications include Certificates III in Hairdressing, Barbering, Hospitality (Restaurant Front of House) and Patisserie (as Entitlement Full Qualifications) and Certificates IV in Beauty Therapy and Commercial Cookery (as Targeted Priority Full Qualifications). This is complementary to the <u>Trade Pathways for Experienced Workers</u> <u>Program</u> which includes Commercial Cookery. New pricing applies from 1 July for Skilling for Recovery (SfR) Priority Part Qualification lists (<u>Redeployment & Youth</u> and Construction) with a 3.1% CPI increase applied to all listed qualification prices.

## **Regional Industry Education Partnerships (RIEP)**

Are you interested in engaging with schools? Get involved in career sessions to promote jobs and career pathways in your business or industry by connecting with your local RIEP project officer. RIEPs work with local businesses to ease access to schools, facilitate activities where employers can communicate directly with students to promote job and career opportunities and builds capacity for schools and businesses to partner.

## Job Readiness workshops:

Employers are invited to participate in Employer Networking sessions for a range of *Job Readiness* workshops being held at schools in Western Sydney as part of the Education Pathways Program. The Education Pathways Program is designed to improve education and career outcomes for students in NSW government high schools by introducing them to a range of vocational training and employment pathways. The Job Readiness Workshops address the gap between student perceptions and employer expectations. Workshop sessions include a focus on employer expectations, interview etiquette and attitude along with

personal presentation and communication. There are also 30-minute Employer Speed Networking sessions, where local employers share their career knowledge with groups of year 10 students to provide valuable, firsthand insights into what employers need for their workforce. If you, or a representative from your organisation, are interested in participating in a Job Readiness workshop at participating Western Sydney schools, please complete the Expression of Interest form. Your input will support students to participate meaningfully in the local economy and become valuable members of the community.

Winter Skills. There's still time for young learners to enrol in one of 1,500 fee-free short courses available for eligible people wanting to develop new skills. Young people are invited to kick-start their careers while having fun in regional winter hotspots including the Snowy Mountains and wine regions. This is a terrific opportunity to combine skills, jobs and fun with plenty of opportunities in tourism, hospitality, accommodation, recreation, wine tasting and retail. Short courses and Statements of Attainment are available for Food Safety Supervisor, First Aid, Hospitality (Café and Club; Espresso Coffee and Hygienic Practices; Operate a bar, RSA, RGS and Service to Customers; Outdoor Recreation; Outdoor Leadership; Recreation and more. ## National reports and updates

## Unemployment rate falls to 3.5% (seasonally adjusted)

Australian Bureau of Statistics released labour statistics on 14 July reporting the lowest unemployment rate since August 1974 when it fell to 2.7%. According to Bjorn Jarvis, head of labour statistics at the ABS, "The large fall in the unemployment rate this month reflects more people than usual entering employment and also lower than usual numbers of employed people becoming unemployed. Together these flows reflect an increasingly tight labour market, with high demand for engaging and retaining workers, as well as ongoing labour shortages." The fall in unemployment through the pandemic has coincided with large increases in job vacancies (480,000 in May 2022). As a result, there was almost the same number of unemployed people in June 2022 (494,000 people) as vacant jobs. "This equates to around one unemployed person per vacant job (1.0), compared with three times as many people before the start of the pandemic (3.1)", Mr Jarvis said. There was also strong growth in youth employment increasing by 23,000 people or 1.1%. <u>Click here</u> to read the full ABS media release.

The ABS has also released its Monthly Household Spending Indicator report for May 2022. It shows positive signs of increased household spending up 7.9% compared to the same time last year. The largest increase was in services spending up 10.2% (largely driven by transport – increased air travel and higher fuel prices). Miscellaneous goods and services rose 12.6%, hotels, cafes and restaurant up 10.3% (though still below the prepandemic level) and recreation and culture up 10%. <u>Click here</u> to access the full report and state by state data.

#### **Jobs and Skills Summit**

Announced earlier this month, the Commonwealth Government will be conducting a <u>Jobs and Skills Summit</u> at Parliament House, Canberra on 1 - 2 September. The purpose of the Summit is to bring together senior ministers with employers, industry groups and unions to address current economic challenges. Paul Zahra CEO of the Australian Retailers Association (ARA) welcomed the announcement of the Summit as an opportunity to address the 40,000 job vacancies in the retail sector alone representing an increase of 40% in just three months. With almost 500,000 job vacancies across the country and near record employment, it's hoped that the Summit will deliver practical measures including a review of employment income thresholds as part of the age pension income test and improving childcare support to increase women's participation in the workforce and address the gender pay gap.

#### **Tourism Research Australia**

TRA has released the regional Tourism Satellite Accounts 2020-21. These reports highlight the importance of tourism in each of Australia's 76 tourism regions. This edition captures the severe disruption caused by COVID-19 and highlights the uneven impact across regions and recovery led by intrastate travel. The NSW reports cover Blue Mountains, Central Coast, Central NSW, Hunter, New England, North Coast, Outback, Riverina, Snowy Mountains, South Coast and Sydney. <u>Click here</u> to view each of the regions data reports which include tourism consumption, employment as well as the regions summary and state summary.

#### **NCVER**

The latest report release from NCVER, *Government funded students and courses 2021*, provides a summary of data relating to government funded VET activity delivered in Australia. In 2021, 1.25 million students were enrolled in government-funded VET, an increase of 4.89% on 2020, with a 5% increase of those enrolled in nationally recognised VET training to 1,198,500 students and 98,400 enrolled in non-nationally accredited training. An estimated 7.4% of the Australian resident population aged 15-64 years participated in government funded VET in 2021. <u>Click here</u> to read the full report.
